

Franklinton Holiday Lights Tour

- Stop #1** **115 N. Main St., Home of Commissioner John & Sheila Allers**
Known locally as the Vann House, the home was originally built by Samuel C. Vann, owner and operator of Sterling Cotton Mills, later a Fruit of the Loom Company and major employer in the Town of Franklinton. The house opened to much fanfare in the community, and has been restored to its original state (with a few modern updates), and is listed on the National Register of Historic Homes.
- Stop #2** **5 Pine St., Home of Macon and Mae Wheeler**
- Stop #3** **20 Pine St.**
- Stop #4** **410 N. Cheatham St., Home of Rebecca and Scott Sherrell**
First home built in the Pine Garden subdivision; home of deceased retired Franklin County Sheriff's Deputy *John Deal, Sr.*, in honor of whom this section of North Cheatham Street has been adopted through Franklinton's *Adopt-a-Street* Program. The home also is a resource for pit bull rescue needs.
- Stop #5** **14 Ramey Cr., Home of Commissioner Art and Chris Wright**
- Stop #6** **102 Williams St., Home of Tony and Judy Gray**
Our home is most often referred to as the Purnell House, and was built in the 1920's. Our house is one of the few remaining homes that still produce steam heat that travels through radiators to heat the house. The barn behind the home was the original home on the site. This home is on the corner of North Hillsborough and Williams Streets, and can be seen easily from both streets.
- Stop #7** **111 N. Hillsborough St., Home of Commissioner Anita and Danny Fuller**
- Stop #8** **104 N. Cheatham St., Home of Tony and Telgia Henson**
- Stop #9** **103 N. Hillsborough St., Home of Bob and Nancy White**
This home is the original Green Home, built in the late 1800's. Part of the house was used as a private school and was then passed down to the Kearneys.
- Stop #10** **103 W. Mason St., Home of Dr. Philip and Mrs. Nance Meador**
The Claude L. and Bessie G. McGhee Home, built in 1911 and presently owned by their grandson, is listed on the National Register of Historic Homes.
- Stop #11** **401 W. Mason St., Home of Patrick Woods**
- Stop #12** **219 W. Mason St., Home of Charles and Jackie Oakley**
Lots of Christmas themed decorations!
- Stop #13** **204 E. Mason St., Home of Robert W. Rice**
House was built prior to 1849, moved on site from next door in 1900. The first Masonic Lodge meeting was held upstairs in 1849.

- Stop #14** **312 E. Mason St., Home of Ronnie Goswick**
The Dr. J. H. Harris House, built in 1902 is currently listed on the National Register of Historic Places thanks to its historic charm and beauty. Fully restored on seven acres in the midst of midtown Franklinton, the home brings memories of Franklinton's 'golden era.'
- Stop #15** **619 E. Mason St., Home of Scott and Trish Tidball**
The Tidball Home was built in 1925.
- Stop #16** **803 E. Mason St., Home of Mr. & Mrs. Ralph Edwards**
Home was built in the 1880's, and has been inhabited by the same family since its construction. We will have traditional lighting.
- Stop #17** **418 Mitchell Ave., Home of Wayne and Martha Williams**
- Stop #18** **102 S. Whitaker St., Home of Horace and Joan Finn**
This home was one of the first homes in Franklinton to have electricity, along with the home of J. O. Nowell in 1910. Whitaker and J. O. Nowell reportedly wired their own homes and became the first customers of the new light plant.
- Stop #19** **20 Fairlane Ave, Home of Mandy Pullin and Samih Amarin**
A historical home built in 1901, this home has many wonderful decorations to enjoy!
- Stop #20** **311 E. Green St., Home of Roxanne and Tim Hudson**
- Stop #21** **104 Bullock St., Home of Tasha Hatten**
- Stop #22** **203 Wilson St., Home of Jeff Thaxton**
- Stop #23** **458 S. Chavis St., Home of Mary and Ollie Perry**
- Stop #24** **130 E. College St., Home of Mary Glover**
Mrs. Glover *loves* Christmastime and decorating her yard! Please enjoy!
- Stop #25** **9 W. College St., Home of Emerson Vinson**
This home was originally built in 1922, and was completely remodeled 75 years later in 1997. Mr. Vinson owns *It's Picture Perfect Landscaping*.
- Stop #26** **448 S. Cheatham St., Home of Deborah Montague**
